Typically groups in Sweet Adelines compete against each other in yearly regional competition to vie for a spot in the following year's international championship. In addition to Sweet Adelines competitions, the Greater Harrisburg Chorus puts on to do corporate or community events.

In 2012, however, Greater Harrisburg stepped beyond the Sweet Adelines circuit to participate in-and win-the inaugural barbershop division of the World Choir Games (WCG), an Olympics-inspired competition. Last year the 11-day event brought together more than 15,000 singers from 64 countries representing 362 choirs in 23 musical categories.

When members of Greater Harrisburg heard about the WCG coming to the United States for the first time, they decided to travel and compete in Cin-Adelines regional contest, which they had never skipped. The WCG allowed male groups, independent groups and groups from Harmony Inc., a rival organization to Sweet Adelines.

"We just needed a break to do something different," Domenick says. "The invitation came to compete at the World
